

REFLECTIONS FROM THE PULPIT

The Spiritual Father

If you have ever gone hiking, you will know of the importance of being prepared for the hiking. Staying hydrated is absolutely, only the most essential equipment—since even a light backpack will begin to feel heavy after hours of trotting along. Proper wear is equally important: hiking boots, shorts for hot days and pants for cold mornings or evenings, some protein bars to keep your body fueled on the journey. However, I believe by far the most important thing you can do is to follow the specific trails laid out for hikers and to heed the various signs posted along the way. A sure way to get lost is to ignore them and to go about your own way. Thousands of hikers go missing each year. While many are found, many more are never heard from again. This is why following a clear laid out path, by experienced and seasoned hikers, is important. Even when you navigate for dangerous and unknown territory, it is often advised to bring with you an experienced guide to help you maneuver through more challenging aspects.

In the Orthodox Church, we have Spiritual Fathers and Confessors. These are usually ordained clergymen who will help guide and hear the confessions of people-often called, "spiritual children." The goal of the Spiritual Father is to promote

freedom in Christ and to point the way to Christ Himself. More acutely, the goal of the Spiritual Father is to form Christ in his Spiritual Children. Like St. Paul writes, "My dear children, for whom I am in travail again until Christ is formed

in you. "(Galatians 4:19) You can think of a Spiritual Father like a seasoned and experienced hiker. The Spiritual Father, like the hiker, knows well the spiritual trails and routes a person must follow on their journey to Christ. The Spiritual Father is also one who knows of potential dangers on the journey. He serves as a spiritual post sign, giving warning and direction to the spiritual child. We call this spiritual direction. The Spiritual Father is himself under spiritual direction from his own Spiritual Father.

closer to Christ . . .

The Spiritual Father is an essential and vitally important part of every Orthodox Christian's life. We must all strive to find a spiritual guide that will help us draw closer to Christ, and a person with whom we can share our deepest and most intimate thoughts. The spiritual father is a like a doctor, with whom we confess to our illness, our worries, our concerns. And at times we can come to him, like a doctor, and mention some abnormalities in our spiritual behavior. A great spiritual father will be able to discern the movements of your heart, especially as the years go by, and they will be able to address the spiritual

weeds that have taken hold of your heart.

However, not all ordained clergy are alike. While you can certainly go to confession to most priests, finding a true spiritual father is a more delicate matter. The Fathers of the Church in the Philokalia have given us small measures by which we

can ascertain a good The Spiritual Father is spiritual father. We must all strive teachings of sacred to find a spiritual quide Scriptures. It is a person that will help us draw who preaches the Gospel. It is someone whose manners, his speech and words, his

> demeanor, puts forth the love of Christ. It is a humble person. A person who is obedient to Christ, to his spiritual father. It is a person who cries out "Thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven." It is a person who is familiar with prayer. A person who guides his spiritual children on this journey. The spiritual father has knowledge, not from reading or theory, but has practical and experimental knowledge. You will come to him and say "I can't seem to pray" or "I struggle listening to my spouse," and the spiritual father, like a doctor, will listen to your struggle and prescribe for you a remedy by which to heal your brokenness and help us better pray or, in the case of the spouse, by which we can humble ourselves just a little more for the sake of Christ.

> A true spiritual father does their best to emulate the life of Christ. They do not exert force on their spiritual children. They point the way to the true Father. They remind the flock to "Come to Christ all you who labor and are heavy laden and He will give you rest."

I will close lastly with the words of Bishop Kallistos Ware, a prominent figure in contemporary Orthodoxy,

"Finally, before we leave the subject of the absence of the Spiritual Father, it is important to recognize the extreme flexibility in the relationship between Spiritual Father, and disciple. Some may see their spiritual father daily or even hourly, praying, eating, and working with him, perhaps sharing the same cell, as often happened in the Egyptian Desert. Others may see him only once a month or once a year; others, again, may visit a Spiritual Father, on but a single occasion in their entire life, yet this will be sufficient to set them on the right path. There are, furthermore, many different types of spiritual father; few will be wonder-workers like St. Seraphim of Sarov. There are numerous priests and laymen who, while lacking the more spectacular endowments of the Spiritual Father are certainly able to provide others with the guidance that they require. Many people imagine that they cannot find a spiritual father, because they *expect him to be of a particular type:* they want a St. Seraphim, and so they close their eyes to the guides whom God is actually sending to them. Often their supposed problems are not so very complicated, and in reality, they already know in their own heart what the answer is. But they do not like the answer. because it involves patient and sustained effort on their part: and so, they look for a *deus ex machina* who, by a single miraculous word, will suddenly make everything easy. Such people need to be helped to an understanding of the true nature of spiritual direction."

STEWARDSHIP COMMITTEE by Nick and Carmen Kallelis

Stewardship Truths

Your Stewardship Committee met on 5/23/2022. The highlights of the meeting included discussion of the importance of being self-supporting, and the need of improving stewardship participation, especially in volunteerism. This becomes of greater importance due to the fact that our church has added members.

Your stewardship committee recognizes the need to better communicate with our parishioners and to provide transparency regarding church matters. We had failed in the past to communicate by not sufficiently keeping our parishioners aware of our church needs and how we will address these issues. Our growth which is welcomed, however, needs improved support of stewardship in order to best serve our church community.

The increased number of families requires additional stewardship and we encourage everyone who can to volunteer in our ministries and committees.

The following information is provided to put the church needs in perspective:

1. Our church continues to increase in number of families. Currently we have 1051 families. There were 973 families in 2017. This represents a 12% growth over the past five years.

2. The ministries are in need of volunteers. Sunday school teachers and assistants are always in need. The stewardship Committee needs new members, especially younger stewards to provide new ideas. The digital age calls for younger persons insights who are accustomed to digital application. The other ministries always welcome new members and assistance.

3. Our festival is going to resume after a two year absence. The preparation of the pastries and food needs helpers in order to be ready by the festival, which is held on the first Thursday - Sunday following Labor Day. (2022 Festival will run Friday - Sunday). Festival volunteers are needed. We cannot have a successful festival with the past limited help. Please sign up today to support this event.

4. In the past the festival was our major source of income supporting our community. The past two years have shown that we cannot rely on the festival for stewardship support. Cancellation of the festival can occur for various reasons, the weather, pandemic or other unforeseen events. The Charlotte community should not be paying our church expenses. The lack of festival funds would have been devastating if not for the two years of PPP support, which provided \$200,000 dollars to pay church expenses. We also benefited from the help of stewards stepping up to fulfill the church needs both financially and by volunteering. Holy Trinity must be self-supporting, which requires every church steward to contribute in as many ways possible.

5. Holy Trinity has aged as the years have passed. Our church, Father C Hall, the parking lot and infrastructure need repairs and improvements. To address these issues the parishioners approved that the festival income would be designed for capital improvements. Twenty five percent of the festival income has been restricted for capital improvements. Over the next three years the approved allocation will be increased each year and in three years 100% of festival funds will be devoted to capital improvements. Church expenses will require stewardship to cover these expenses.

6. Less than 1% of our parishioners attend the pre-budget meeting. Less than 10% attend the General Assembly Meeting and the election of the Parish Council. This is a sign of lack of interest and commitment by our stewards. The strength of our church community and the ability to provide the necessary services requires everyone to display stewardship.

A closing note is a reminder the summer vacation period will be upon us about the time this issue of The Voice is published. Please continue your stewardship during the vacation period when church attendance tends to decrease. The church does not go on vacation. Our church expenses continue and stewardship support is needed during the summertime.

The past two years have been trying times for us all. Stewards stepped up the best they could and kept our church activities going.

Now your time, talents and treasures are greatly needed. Let's continue to display our stewardship as we continue to increase our church community. We need everyone to be stewards.






