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REFLECTIONS FROM THE PULPIT



Rev. Dr. Jonathan Resmini,Interim Dean of the Cathedral

What was your early connection with the Church?

Fr. Jonathan — I was baptized because my family was Greek, but we didn't grow up going to the Church. There aren't many early memories there for me. No Sunday School, no Greek dance, or anything else. High school was a personally challenging time for me. This brought me to Church. I remember watching the film Passion of the Christ. It felt like my first real encounter with Christ. Funny enough, after I left the theater I went straight to the bookstore and bought a Bible. Reading the Scriptures left me with more questions than answers.

Fr. Christian — At eight years old, my mom and I converted to the Orthodox Church and —Well, what 8 year old child really has a choice at that age?— I had the blessing of being baptized alongside my mother. However, I was born in Colombia.

My first language is Spanish. And going to a Greek Orthodox Church was disorienting. But it was my step-father's mother... so my Yia-Yia, who was my connecting point to the Church. She transmitted her faithfulness to me even though we could barely communicate with each other.

Who influenced you in your spiritual formation?

Fr. Jonathan — After seeing the Passions of the Christ, I had a strange and strong desire to serve God. I did not know what this meant. So I made my way to the Church. I sat down with the priest there and said to him, "I think want to become a priest." Fr. Nick looked back at me, with my five ear-piercings, highlighted-blonde spiky hair, and hot-topic attire and said, "Why don't you first come to Church and we'll see what happens." From there began my life in the Church. His guidance,

along with several other clergy for the next several years, helped shape me along a path to further study the Orthodox Faith. Styles change and so does our understanding of faith.

Fr. Christian — My Spiritual Father is the person that has most influenced me in my spiritual life and really every other facet of my life as well. He is a God-fearing and Christ-centered person who is filled with Spirit. I had a lot of pent up anger and misplaced trust growing up. My Spiritual Father helped dissolve that with his love. It's weird how a person can love you. But being embraced by his love made me understand a little bit better how God can love us too. The initial confessions with my spiritual father were some of the most healing times of my life. Like a good gardener he uprooted the weeds without disturbing the flowers.

Did you feel called to ministry? And how/why did you pursue that?

Fr. Jonathan — Initially I did. I did different programs with this in mind. This left me with a strong feeling of being called to some type of ministry in the Church. Early on, I thought this was a call to the priesthood, but as I continued my studies at Hellenic College and Holy Cross, I began to question if that is where I was meant to be. At some point, I got the sense that God wasn't calling me so much to formal ordained ministry, but to teach the faith as a professor. Many of the years following my initial experience in Christ, was pursuing this ultimate goal of teaching. When I finally became a professor, I found myself unfilled, and returned to the initial feeling of being called to ordained ministry.

Fr. Christian — I did not. And I can honestly say that I have never felt called to ordained ministry. I went to Hellenic College and Holy Cross with a desire to deepen my understanding of the Orthodox Faith. I fell in love with Christ. In the same way that a man falls in love with a woman. My spiritual father helped with this formation. He gave me a rule to never miss a service. And at the time in school, we had services twice a day, almost every day. The Church services really formed my heart, while the university helped form my mind. When I thought of what work I would do after graduating with my Masters, I had only two thoughts: (1) I can do any job, because it doesn't matter in a sense. What matters is loving God and neighbor in all I do, or (2) I can pursue the Priesthood, precisely because there is no higher vocation or job that a person can fulfill.

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HOLY TRINITY CATHEDRAL FOUNDATION SERIES Pt. 1

Foundation Operations

To have lasted for fifty years, Holy Trinity Greek Orthodox Foundation (HTGOF, or The Foundation) relies upon two constants. First, a reasonable interpretation of the rules and guidance offered through the Indenture which established the Foundation in 1973. All trustees are expected to be familiar with its provisions. Second, the good will and hard work of the individuals elected to serve as Trustees. In these fifty years, 55 individuals have been trustees, serving an average of just over than 6 1/3 years each.

Organization

Composition: The Foundation is comprised of seven (7) Trustees. The trustees are elected for five-year terms, serve on a voluntary basis, and receive no compensation.

Meetings: The Foundation shall meet at least twice each calendar year and can meet more often if a meeting is properly called by the Chairman, or by three trustees. Since January 2020, the Trustees have held 18 meetings. About one half of those were via Zoom Video conferencing during the Covid Pandemic lockdowns and restrictions (March 2020 through October 2021). Attendance at those meetings was 93%.

Quorum: At least five of the Trustees must be present to constitute a quorum at any meeting, but less than a majority may adjourn any meeting. A quorum is necessary at any meeting to authorize any action of the Trustees.

Removal of Trustee: By the affirmative vote of five-sevenths (5/7) of the entire Board of Trustees, any officer or Trustee may be removed for any cause whatever at any meeting of the Trustees.

On Sunday, February 5, 2023, The Foundation will mark the fiftieth anniversary of its creation and the signing of the Indenture by the first trustees. We will commemorate the occasion by holding our annual Memorial Sunday with the reading of all names of persons memorialized during those fifty years. That will be followed by a community luncheon in Father C Hall sponsored by the Foundation. We hope that you will join us.



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


WHOOO'S IN THE NEWS AT HTGO PRESCHOOL? by Maria Kleto



CENTENNIAL CELEBRATION

In commemoration of our beloved community's centennial, the committee has had the great honor and task of helping with the addition of two beautiful and lasting tributes to our 100-year celebration: the Dedication of the Historical Marker and the unveiling of the community's Centennial Icon.

On Sunday, August 28th, the parish gathered outside the cathedral for a special blessing of the historical marker ahead of the official dedication of the marker at 10am on Friday September 9th, kicking off this year's Greek Festival. In attendance at the dedication were

Mayor Vi Liles, former Mayor and North Carolina Governor Pat McCrory, former mayors Richard Vinroot and Jennifer Roberts, members of the Cathedral Centennial Celebration Committee and other special guests.

On Friday, September 23rd, iconographer Panos Kontos, through his associate, installed the Centennial Icon in the narthex of the cathedral. The icon depicts the three angels which visited Abraham and Sarah (Genesis 18:1-15) holding the present day Cathedral. These angels symbolize the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit. Below the cathedral are images of all our past houses of worship, showing the growth and progression of our community over the last 100 years. To the far left is the Chamber of Commerce on East Trade, (1920s), next the former Westminster Presbyterian Church on South Boulevard (1930s) and finally the 1954 Cathedral on East Boulevard with the Jones



Mansion in the background. The people portrayed in the icon are representative of the era; two parishioners in front of the church are holding icons of St Nektarios and St Luke, a nod to our sister parishes.


will require a dedicated effort by all to support our ministries and financial commitment to become self-supporting. Annual registration of our church membership is required by our by-laws.



OCTOBER 28, 1940 THE OXI DAY

«Alors, c'est la guerre ». History. 1. The Scene.

Eve of October 28,1940, Emmanuelle Grazzi, the Italian Ambassador in Athens, presented an ultimatum to the Greek Prime Minister, John Metaxa, demanding free passage of Italian troops to occupy any Greek territory.

Metaxas response was: "Alors, c'est la guerre ». "Then, It is war". "OXI". NO.

Metaxas did not try to negotiate an agreement, to buy time, to consult his administration and share responsibility for the answer to the ultimatum, despite the fact that, by that time, the Axis controlled all Southern Europe, part of Northern Africa and part of central Europe.

He rejected the ultimatum. He knew that this answer was the feeling of every Greek citizen.

Within hours, Italy attacked Greece from Albania, which was already occupied.

Athens Radio, early in the morning of October 29th announced:

Since 05:30 am the enemy is attacking our vanguard on the Greek-Albanian border.

Our forces are defending the fatherland.

History 2. The Dictators and Metaxas Response.

Benito Mussolini. Mussolini worked on the idea for "Spazio Vitale for Italy" since 1920s.

He dreamed of Hegemony on Mediterranean-Danubian- Balkan region.

An empire stretching from the Strait of Gibraltar to the Strait of Hormuz.

1936, signed/forced a pact with Francisco Franco of Spain.

1939, April 7th, Invaded Albania.

1940, June, declared war against France and Britain, and then was accusing Greece of been a British ally.

1940, August 15, the "day of Dormition of Theotokos", sinked the Greek Cruiser "Elli" at Tinos.

1940, September, Invaded France, Egypt, and the British Somaliland.

According to Mussolini's generals, they were to occupy Athens within a week of the attack.



Adolf Hitler. The Fuehrer.

Hitler Sought "Space for the German people".

In 1933, Became Chancellor.

In 1934, Became "Fuehrer". "Leader". A Nazi title to define his role of



1913, Was decorated at WW I, by the German army.

1921, Became Leader of Nazi Party.

1924, Was imprisoned for Coup attempt. Wrote the political manifesto "My Struggle".

absolute authority in Germany's Third Reich. Was Dictator from 1933 until his suicide on April 30, 1945.

Greek counter-offensive (13 November,1940 – 27 April,1941).



1924, Was released from the prison and began promoting the Pan-Germanism, the anti-Semitism, the anti-Communism, and the racially motivated ideology- "the superiority of the Arian race".

Attacked the Treaty of Versailles.

The Greek-Italian War. (October 29,1940-April 27,1941).

During the first few days of the Italian attack, their forces gained a small front but soon they experienced the tenacious resistance of the Hellenic Army.

The Italians had to contend with the mountainous and muddy terrain at the Greek—Albanian border and they had difficulty to mobilize and to transfer their military equipment.

On the other hand, Greeks were able to do so using horses and mules while they were assisted by the Greek women.

The weather was very cold with snow and ice, and in addition communicative diseases developed, especially skin disease by lice.

With the support of British bombers, the Greeks proceeded to a counter offensive (November 13, 1940 until the day that Athens fell to Germans-April 27, 1941) and occupied a significant part of the Albanian land including cities in Albania such as Himara, Klisoura, Pogradec.

Consequences of Italian Defeat by the Greeks. 1.

1. Hitler wants to secure the Southern Europe. Mistrust the Italian strength.

On April 6, 1941, Hitler attacked Greece (Operation Marita) at Metaxas line (Rupel Strongholds) at the Greek Bulgarian borders but never took the Metaxas Line, despite the fact that, at that time, 1. the Metaxas Line was sub optimally reinforced because the majority of the Greek effort was directed toward the Italian attack at Albania, 2. the British support was sub optimal at that time and finally 3. Despite the fact that the Metaxas Line was designed to defend Greece against a Bulgarian attack. It was not designed to sustain air attacks of Germany's air force.

Yet the German forces never took the Metaxas Line.

The Metaxas Line was surrendered after Athens was taken by the Germans (April 27th 1941) and the Greek Government had signed an agreement.

As German forces diversion's result, Hitler delayed the Barbarossa Plan (Attack against Russia); because of the delay, he initiated the attack close to winter, and he suffered the great defeat by the Russians.

Hitler blamed Mussolini's "Greek fiasco" for his failed campaign in Russia.

2.1947. The Dodecanese Islands were ceded to Greece by Italy, as a result of its defeat by the Greeks.


3. Winston Churchill made the famous Declaration:
