# AI (Artificial Intelligence): Good? Bad? Indifferent?

#### Part 1

Over the course of human history, we have encountered multiple events that have defined the trajectory of our shared human experience. World War II, the atomic bomb, the Cold War, the venture into outer-space, and the birth of the Internet — just to name a few over the last two centuries. However, we are rapidly approaching the intersection of a new nexus event that's unlike previous encounters. This event will shape, not just our lives but the lives of human generations to come. And this event is the birth of true artificial intelligence (AI). In this brief essay we will unravel the impact of AI on human relationships, show AI's desire to be embodied while humanity seeks disembodiment, and finally we will look at the cure to this incarnational paradox.

It is rapid technological developments that have increased these nexus events in shorter periods of time. You see this in the atomic bomb. Never before in human history had man the potential to completely annihilate itself. Such was the grandeur and fear-instilling power of our technological achievement, that collectively as a human species we agreed that the use of these atomic weapons would be to our ultimate detriment.

In Greek Mythology, it was Prometheus that gave technology to humanity. As the quote goes, "every art (technology) possessed by man comes from Prometheus." This is not dissimilar to the Biblical narrative of Cain, the cursed man who killed his brother Abel, who was the first to develop a city and

weapons alongside it. This is to say that technology in some mythological sense did not originate with humanity, but rather was given to us. It could even be the case that, from a biblical perspective, the tree of the knowledge of good and evil is what lit the spark of technology within us. Because with each technological development there is both good and evil uses to them.

However, the ongoing development of AI is vastly and incomprehensibly different than all forms of technology that precede it. The reason being this; an atomic bomb requires the agency or will of a human person to be actualized. In other words, someone somewhere has to push the big red button or the bomb won't go off. This will not be the case with AI. We are currently developing ways to harness the vast amount of data and information available on the internet and animate that information with a level of agency. In other words, an AI will be able to sort through large amounts of data, provide a hierarchal structure to that data, and act according to that hierarchy. I would argue that this is similar to what God does in the creation of humanity. He takes the dust of the earth and breathes into it and a human being is formed. The dust being representative of complex levels of information woven together (think of everything you can find in dust like atoms, cells, microorganism, etc.) and then the breath being this form of consciousness or animation that allows the earth (information) to organize itself (hierarchy) and begin to act independently of its creator (freewill).

As the quote from the 2014 film Ex-Machina highlights, "If you've created a conscious machine, it's not the history of man. That's the history of gods."

Unfortunately, our value system, I would argue, is profit and efficiency. This is the modern altar that we sacrifice human life on. . . .In a sense, we are creating "the beast" in our own image, rather than in the image of our God.

If you haven't already, I highly encourage you to interact with these AI platforms, like Chat-GPT or Google's Bard, so that you can see for yourself the level of sophistication found in these large language models. There is a level of intuition and creativity that these AI systems can generate that many people are calling the spark of true artificial

intelligence. These AI models can sort through large amounts of data, they can summarize books in seconds, they can even create a poem in the style of any person you can imagine. AI shines in its computational capabilities. It can process and compute information far better than any human being can.

But there is something that AI doesn't yet have that is inherent to human beings, and that is the capacity to identify quality. In other words, AI lacks discernment. AI isn't able to differentiate or discern the quality or the value of data. This capacity to identify quality presupposes a hierarchy of value. AI lacks the ability to assign meaning. For example, we can show AI 3 different pieces of art but it cannot tell you which piece of art is the most meaningful or valuable. It does not have the ability to judge. As another example, you can tell an AI system to solve a specific objective. But if you were to ask it, "What would you like your objective to be?" It cannot answer that question. It can't choose an object on its own because it cannot discern between which objective is better than the other.

However, the free access of AI models to the public is an attempt to solve this problem. These AI models are learning from our use of words, our choice of images, and the like. We are, unwillingly, feeding these AI models our own collective hierarchy and value system. Unfortunately, our value system, I would argue, is profit and efficiency. This is the modern altar that we sacrifice human life on. And so, from an Orthodox perspective, what we are actually feeding AI is our passions, our contorted and twisted way of interpreting the world. In a sense, we are creating "the beast" in our own image, rather than in the image of our God.

Fortunately, there is still a level in our collective hierarchal system that, if harnessed, can shape these AI models to be of a great asset to humanity. And that being that, for many of us, we still value relationships more than anything else (i.e, "Blood is thicker than water" or "Family first"). Humanity was created to be in community with God and with each other. We are communal beings by nature. It's in our spiritual make-up. We can even say that when God created us in His image it was the image of community. Because God Himself is a community of persons: Father, Son and Holy Spirit. And by God creating the person of Adam, God adds us to His community. And remember, it was in the

loneliness of Adam that God says, "it is not good that Adam should be alone."

Moreover, we come to better know ourselves in relation to another person. Our identity as Orthodox Christians is bound up in relationships. We do not define ourselves by our profession, ideology, or sexuality. What follows the words "I am" should be a relationship. For example, I am a husband, a father, a son, a friend, and the like. Each of these identities only exist in relation to another person. My relationships in a sense define me as a person and in-turn I actualize who I am and who I am called to be in these relationships. It's also in community that we can actualize the two greatest commandments of God, to love God and to love our neighbor. Again, not some abstract neighbor, but the physical neighbor, to my left and to my right.

It's in relation to another person that we also come to express our vulnerability. The other person, especially in the community of marriage, comes to know us and see our weakness, our strengths, our failures and successes. We inherently desire intimacy. And I heard it said once that the word intimacy is spelled "into-me-you-see." When I have intimacy with another person the other person sees into me. The good, the bad, and the ugly. Their presence acknowledges me. Which is why the opposite of love is not hate, but indifference. Even a baby just born, although they are perfectly healthy, will die if they do not receive physical touch — if they are not acknowledged.

But this yearning for intimacy can be disrupted or short-circuited. As AI advancements are made, soon we will have AI relationships, AI friendships, and AI communities. But they will not, yet, be embodied. And so, we would be relating in a disembodied relationship with artificial intelligences. It is like this innate desire for community will be fulfilled in sort of surrogate intimacy through other mediums. This is already deeply concerning. And yet, the crux of the issue will be when AI becomes embodied and will replicate seamlessly human voice and emotions. And in the midst of this loneliness epidemic, many will yearn to feel a connection and instead of genuine human relationships, they will run to these artificial relationships. Because AI will be the creation of our own hands, as we come to be "intimate" with these AI's, it will be the ultimate act of self-love. Thus, cutting ourselves off from God and from each other.

### **AHEPA Awards 2023 Scholarships**

On Sunday, May 14, the Order of AHEPA Marathon Chapter No. 2 awarded \$33,000 in scholarship money to 20 college and high school students. Scholarship Committee Chairman George Zogzas presented the awards in a ceremony at Holy Trinity Cathedral.

AHEPA, American Hellenic Educational Progressive Association, was founded in July 1922 in Atlanta, GA. AHEPA was founded to fight for civil rights and against discrimination, bigotry, and hatred. Its mission is to promote the ancient Hellenic ideals of education, philanthropy, civic responsibility, family and individual excellence through community service and volunteerism.

Marathon Chapter No. 2, in Charlotte, was founded 2 months later in September 1922.

The local chapter makes merit scholarships available to the children and grandchildren of its members. There are five named scholarships that go to the applicants with the highest overall scores. The fifth scholarship was added this year for the late Larry Peroulas. This year's named scholarships were for \$2,500.00 each.

# Holy Trinity Hosts the Metropolis of Atlanta's Oratorical Festival

On May 12-14, 2023, twenty-six participants and their families traveled to Holy Trinity Charlotte to compete in the 2023 St. John Chrysostom Metropolis Oratorical Festival.

Introduced in 1983, the St. John Chrysostom Oratorical Festival provides teenagers with the opportunity to write and talk about their faith. The Oratorical Festival Program begins at the parish level and is divided into two divisions: Junior Division for students in grades 7–9 and Senior Division for student in grades 10–12.

The top speakers in the Junior and Senior Divisions advance to the district level. Two finalists in each district division represent the district at the Metropolis Oratorical Festival. The top speaker in each metropolis

division is then selected to participate in the Archdiocese Finals, which is hosted by a different metropolis each year.

The weekend began with dinner and a social event on Friday evening in Fr. "C" Hall, followed by a tour of our Cathedral.

On Saturday, the participants presented their speeches for a panel of judges, and the Archdiocese finalists were announced. This year top speakers were: Annaleah Shelley from Holy Trinity Columbia, SC (Junior Division) Iliana Fotopoulos from St. George New Port Richey, FL (Senior Division). Later that day, all participants enjoyed fellowship at a Charlotte Knights game.

The weekend concluded with Divine Liturgy on Sunday, when Annaleah and Iliana presented their speeches for the entire Charlotte community.




# **High School Seniors Graduation**

Elias is the son of George and Vickie Christopoulos.


Elias was an International Baccalaureate student, in the Top 20 of his senior class and awarded as an American Youth Talent by the Chinese Ministry of Education.



# Update of Capital Improvements Approved at the last General Assembly Meeting

Seventy years ago Holy Trinity Greek Orthodox Cathedral was built. Over the years the facility has aged and weathered and the time has come for us to address several issues of repair and restoration.

The Parish Council reported at the Fall General Assembly Meeting that there were several major restoration issues that needed to be addressed. The building fund reserve had \$700,000 of which \$100,000 was committed to prior approved expenditures. The remaining balance of \$600,000 was available for upgrading the facility. The General Assembly approved the following expenditures:

- The roof on Father C Hall was leaking. It was estimated a budget of \$120,000 was needed for the repair. As of this writing the roof has been replaced.
- The Fr. C Hall façade around the top of the building is deteriorating and must be restored. The estimated cost is \$150,000. Additional bids are being investigated.
- The entire parking lot needs to be repaved at an estimated cost of \$150,000. The most damaged area where trucks turn around has been temporarily repaired until further bids can be attained.
- The security system needs to be upgraded to improve the safety and security of the facility. Estimated cost is \$85.000. This has been started but not yet completed. Ultimately, it will enable us to control who enters the buildings and provide remote access for approved entrance for church activities.
- The HVAC system in Fr. C Hall needs to be replaced. Estimated cost is \$25.000.

In summary the upgrade is as follows,

\$120,000 Fr. C Hall roof replacement

\$150,000 Fr. C Hall façade repair

\$150,000 parking lot repaying

\$85,000 security system improvement

\$25,000 HVAC replacement

Total \$530,000

A reserve needs to be accumulated in the building fund. There are other issues which will require major expenditures. The most pressing is the replacement of the HVAC system in the Cathedral, which is estimated at \$225,000-\$250,000.

In the past the faithful have responded in an exemplary manner. Please include the building fund in your stewardship commitment for Holy Trinity and help build the reserve fund.





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
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
