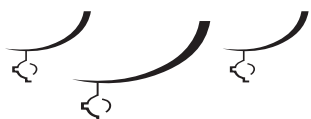

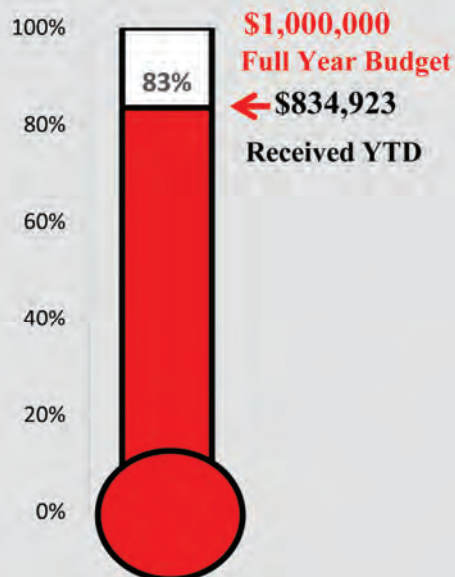

Reading the Scriptures Daily: An Orthodox Christian Way of Life

In every Orthodox church, the Holy Scriptures are everywhere—proclaimed aloud in the services, sung in the Psalms, depicted in iconography, and woven into our prayers. Yet for many faithful Orthodox Christians, daily personal engagement with Scripture can feel unfamiliar, intimidating, or even unnecessary. Some wonder: *Isn't Scripture primarily something we hear in church? Isn't interpretation the responsibility of clergy or scholars?*

The Orthodox Church answers these questions with a clear and loving invitation: **Scripture belongs to the whole Church**, and daily engagement with it is not only encouraged—it is a vital part of our spiritual life.

Scripture as Life, Not Information

From an Orthodox perspective, Scripture is not a textbook of religious facts, nor a collection of isolated moral teachings. It is **the living testimony of God's revelation**, given within and preserved by the Church. We do not read the Bible merely to learn *about* God; we read it to encounter Him.

This is why the Church always approaches Scripture prayerfully. Before the Gospel is read during the Divine Liturgy, we pray: *"Illumine our hearts, O Master who loves mankind, with the pure light of Your divine knowledge."* This prayer reveals something essential: Scripture is understood only when the heart is illumined, when reading is joined to humility, repentance, and prayer.

Daily reading of Scripture, therefore, is not an academic exercise. It is a **discipline of attentiveness**, a way of placing ourselves daily before the voice of God, allowing His word to shape our thoughts, desires, and actions.

The Church Gave Us the Scriptures

One of the most important truths often overlooked is this: **the Bible did not create the Church; the Church preserved and recognized the Bible.** The books of Scripture were written, collected, read, and affirmed within the worshiping life of the early Christian community.

Understanding this protects us from a common modern misunderstanding—that the Bible can be interpreted apart from the Church, or that every reader is equally authoritative on its meaning. In Orthodoxy, Scripture is never separated from **Holy Tradition**, which includes the liturgical life of the Church, the writings of the Fathers and Mothers, the Ecumenical Councils, and the lived experience of the saints.

Daily Scripture reading, then, is not an individualistic activity. Even when we read alone, we read **with the Church**, guided by the same faith that has been handed down for centuries.

Scripture in the Liturgical Life

The Orthodox Church is saturated with Scripture because **the Bible was meant to be heard and prayed**, not merely analyzed. The Psalms form the backbone of nearly every service. The Gospels and Epistles are read continuously throughout the liturgical year, ensuring that the faithful are immersed in the whole narrative of salvation.

This liturgical use of Scripture teaches us how to read it properly. We learn that passages are not isolated proof texts but part of a larger story—the story of God's covenant, fulfilled in Christ, and lived out in His Body, the Church.

When we read Scripture daily at home, we are extending what happens in church into our personal lives. The words we hear proclaimed on Sunday become the words that guide us on Monday.

How the Orthodox Church Interprets Scripture

Orthodox interpretation of Scripture is deeply **Christ-centered**. All of Scripture, from Genesis to Revelation,

finds its meaning in Christ. The Old Testament is not discarded but fulfilled; the New Testament is not detached but rooted in what came before.

The Fathers of the Church teach us to read Scripture on multiple levels: historical, moral, and spiritual. Events are real, but they also point beyond themselves—to Christ, to the Church, and to our own transformation. This approach guards us from both rigid literalism and vague symbolism, keeping us grounded in the fullness of the faith.

Daily reading, when done patiently and humbly, trains us in this way of seeing. Over time, Scripture begins to interpret *us*, revealing where we need repentance, healing, and growth.

Practical Encouragement for Daily Reading

For those unsure where to begin, the Church offers wisdom: **start small and be consistent**. A short passage from the Gospel, a Psalm, or the daily Epistle reading is more fruitful than ambitious plans that quickly fade.

Always begin with prayer. Read slowly. Do not rush to conclusions. If something is confusing, let it be. The goal is not mastery but faithfulness.

Most importantly, Scripture should lead us to **love**—love of God and love of neighbor. If our reading does not make us more patient, more merciful, more humble, then we have missed its purpose.

An Invitation to Go Deeper

Because Scripture is so central to the life of the Church, I will be offering a **Thursday evening catechism class** devoted specifically to this topic. Together, we will explore:

- + The history and formation of the biblical canon
- + How Scripture is used liturgically in the Orthodox Church
- + How to read and interpret the Bible from an Orthodox Christian perspective

+ How daily Scripture reading fits into prayer, fasting, and the sacramental life

This class is intended not only to inform but to encourage—to help each of us grow more confident, faithful, and prayerful in our engagement with God's word (see details below).

Scripture as a Daily Encounter with Christ

In the end, daily reading of Scripture is not about discipline alone. It is about **relationship**. The same Christ who speaks to us in the Gospel at the Divine Liturgy speaks to us quietly when we open the Scriptures at home.

When we read daily, we place ourselves before Him again and again, saying with our lives, *"Speak, Lord, for Your servant is listening."*

May we learn not only to read the Scriptures, but to **live them**, so that the word of God may take root in our hearts and bear fruit for the life of the world.

Elections 2025

On Sunday, December 7, 2025, Holy Trinity held its Parish Elections. Voters were electing candidates to fill five Parish Council and one Foundation seat. The five Parish Council members whose terms ended in 2025 were Hunter Clarke, Drew Dudley, Kathy Kanellopoulos, John Mahairas, and Gus A. Pappas. Two of the five chose to run for another three year term (Kanellopoulos, Pappas). The ballot included six additional candidates: George Andrews, Hresanthe Georgopoulos, George Liapis, Bill Katsaros, Dino Pappas, and Nicholas Stavros.

Nick Kantsios completed his five year term on the Foundation this year. Trustees must stay off the Board for at least one year before running again. One candidate was nominated to fill the one open seat. The candidate was George Zogzas (Guest Editor of The Voice).

As in the recent past, parishioners could cast their vote electronically when they appeared in person on Election Day on the Holy Trinity campus. Elections Committee chair Leonidas Kyriazis and the committee conducted an orderly and smooth election process.

A total of 343 ballots were cast.

Q. What made you accept the challenge of serving on the Parish Council?

A. I’ve tried to serve Holy Trinity through many different avenues and as much as I could while owning a business. Having recently sold that business and

having more time to dedicate this seemed like the natural next step.

A. The biggest challenge will be to make sure everyone feels like I care about their opinions even if we disagree on things.

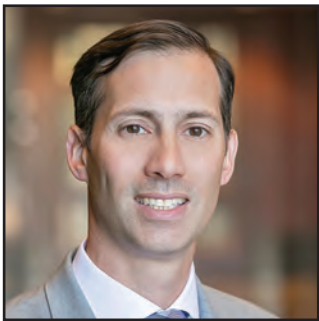
Q. What would you like to see the community do to support your efforts?

The three opportunities/challenges I see are as follows: (1) how do we retain our youth when they enter adulthood, (2) how do we assimilate people finding Orthodoxy into our Parish, and (3) what does it mean to be Greek Orthodox specifically at Holy Trinity?

Q. What would you like to see the community do to support your efforts?

A. Pray for us and forgive us for our short comings.

Q. Have you served before? If so, when and where (if not at Holy Trinity)?

A. Three consecutive three year terms at Holy Trinity (2011-2019); serving as Vice President (2016, 2017) and President (2018, 2019).


Adult Basketball
